The Native Hawaiian Education Council (NHEC) was established in 1988 under the Native Hawaiian Education Act, the statutory responsibilities of the NHEC are to coordinate, assess, report and make recommendations on the effectiveness of existing education programs for Native Hawaiians, the state of present Native Hawaiian education efforts, and improvements that may be made to existing programs, policies and procedures to improve the educational attainment of Native Hawaiians. The NHEC is made up of not more than 21 members--10 consumers, 10 providers and a representative from the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. To ensure adequate representation of island communities, the law established seven island councils for the following islands: Hawai`i, Maui, Lana`i, Moloka`i, Oahu, Kauai and Ni`ihau. Island Councils are made up of parents, students and other community stakeholders. The Native Hawaiian Education Council will maintain this section of the guide.

The Native Hawaiian Education Council's has included within their *kuleana* (responsibility) the maintaining this section of the guide.

SEARCHING FOR FEDERAL GRANTS

Grants administered by federal agencies differ by eligibility requirements, award amount, application process, and timing. Online resources can help you determine what types of funding are available and how to apply for that funding.

Grants.gov is the primary source of information and mode of submitting applications for federal grants and awards of financial assistance, administered through 1,000 programs and 26 federal grantmaking agencies to recipients carrying out a public purpose of support or stimulation. In FY2009, Grants.gov received over 300,000 application submissions. Users must complete the Grants.gov registration process, which requires organizations to obtain a Data Universal Number System (DUNS) number and to register with the Central Contractor Registry (CCR). There is a user guide available, and for general questions, call: 1-800-518- 4726 or email support@grants.gov. Note: The registration process takes approximately three to five business days.

Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) is a governmentwide compendium of all federal programs available to state and local governments; domestic public, quasi-public, and private profit and nonprofit organizations and institutions; specialized groups; and individuals. Organizations may utilize the CFDA to identify programs and information on federal financial and nonfinancial assistance; however, only government agencies can apply for grants on the CFDA website directly. There is a user guide available, and individuals may purchase the CFDA by contacting the U.S. Superintendent of Documents at 1-866-512-1800 or the U.S. Government Printing Office's online bookstore. For assistance using the CFDA website, you may contact the Federal Service Desk or call 1-866-606- 8220.

The Federal Register is the official daily publication of the federal government and provides Notices of Funds Available (NOFA). The U.S. Government Printing Office's Federal Register database makes it easy to search for updates and information on the most recent grant and award opportunities.

Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants

The Public Service Loan Forgiveness Program

- Purpose: The PSLF Program is intended to encourage individuals to enter and continue to work full-time in public service jobs. Under this program, borrowers may qualify for forgiveness of the remaining balance of their Direct Loans after they have made 120 qualifying payments on those loans while employed full time by certain public service employers.
- **Types of Projects:** If you have *FFEL Program* or Perkins Loan Program loans, you may consolidate them into a *Direct Consolidation Loan* to take advantage of PSLF. However, only payments you make on the new Direct Consolidation Loan will count toward the required 120 qualifying payments for PSLF. Payments made on your FFEL Program or Perkins Loan Program loans before you consolidated them, even if they were made under a qualifying repayment plan, do not count as qualifying PSLF payments. In addition, if you made qualifying payments on a Direct Loan and then consolidate it into a Direct Consolidation Loan, you must make 120 qualifying payments on the Direct Consolidation Loan.

Teacher Education Assistance for College and Higher Education Grants (TEACH)

- Purpose: To provide annual grants of up to \$4,000 to eligible undergraduate and graduate students who agree to teach specified high-need subjects at schools serving primarily disadvantaged populations for four years within eight years of graduation. For students who do not fulfill their service requirements, grants convert to Direct Unsubsidized Stafford Loans with interest accrued from the date of award.

Basic research in multidisciplinary areas related to these disciplines is especially encouraged. Support is also provided for state-of-the-art user facilities in the above disciplines, undergraduate student research, faculty enhancement, curriculum development, instrumentation, laboratory improvement, as well as support for research opportunities for women, minority, and disabled scientists and engineers.
